Purpose of the Role

This role reports to the Depute Rector – Pastoral.

Key Tasks and Responsibilities

- Provide an independent and confidential counselling service to pupils through individual sessions, responding to their personal, social, emotional or educational concerns.
- Promote a caring and supportive environment where such concerns may be explored, thereby promoting mental and emotional health.
- Work with a diverse range of issues including bereavement and loss, transition, self-harm, depression and anxiety, trauma, abuse of any kind.
- Maintain confidentiality (except in those circumstances, in line with BACP practice, where this should be breached).
- Uphold good practice as described by the BACP ethical guidelines.
- Be responsible for own Professional Development maintenance and updating knowledge and awareness through Continuing Professional Development (CPD).
- Make referrals, where appropriate and with the relevant consent, to other agencies.
- Maintain appropriate records and to keep these secure.
- Liaise with school staff and other professionals as appropriate to ensure the effective operation of the service.
- Be alert to trends and patterns of problems and to be willing to identify causes and recommend corrective action.
- Play an active role in safeguarding children and adhere with guidance from relevant school policies.
- Maintain a high level of knowledge and awareness of changes and developments in the fields of counselling and education and their impact on the delivery of counselling.
- Ensure regular attendance at clinical supervision, as required by the BACP.
- Contribute in any other reasonable way to promote the safety and wellbeing of the students
- Support young carers within the School.

- Post graduate Diploma or Masters Degree in Counselling or Psychotherapy
- BACP Accreditation, UKCP registration or BPC
- Further therapeutic training, experience or qualification in working with children and young people
